Mr. Butte wrote a book about their experiences, <u>Darlene's Silver Streak and the Bradford Model T Girls</u> and signed copies.

SATURDAY, SEPT. 22 & 23 - AGRICULTURE DAYS


Jordbruksdargarna displays, demonstrations, and tractor show will take place here at the Henry County Museum.

GYPSY COEDS AND THE "SILVER STREAK"

History was made on April 29, 2018, as John Butte entertained at the HCHS Annual Meeting and Luncheon. This two-part story told of Bradford, Illinois coeds, also referred to as Gypsy coeds, who enjoyed ambitious adventures in an old Tin Lizzie. Every summer, from 1934 – 1942, the girls would climb into their Model T and travel, sometimes cross county, to enjoy parts unknown. John's mother and aunt participated in the gypsy fun!

The second part of his story is equally intriguing. After the passing of his mother, John began a search for that notorious Model T. The girls affectionately called the car "Silver Streak." John found the car and purchased it in 2012.

John's passion and research merited two positive outcomes. The first is John's book, "Darlene's Silver Streak and the Bradford Model T Girls," which was published in 2015.



The second is equally impressive. The Silver Streak was chosen to be featured in a debuting television show on the Discovery Channel. As of now the show has the code name, "Garage Gold." It aired on April 30th.

The Gypsy Coeds and the Silver Streak have provided us with a rich history. It is a history that is continually shared in print, on the silver screen, and in narrative orations. The Gypsy

Coeds and Silver Streak remind us that summer is a time for adventure and fun! It is a time to make history!

WELL, HELLO DOLLY!

Dolls are an important part of history. They are figures of human beings, children's toys, and even have been involved in religious rituals and magic. Their reputation is one of being a member of the oldest known toys, having been around for thousands of years.

Dolls have evolved and changed with time. Their progression is as follows: wooden paddle dolls, inuit dolls (soapstone and bone, dressed in fur), apple dolls (heads made from dried apples), corn husk dolls (didn't have faces), Pennywoods (carved wooden dolls and ragdolls made by

settlers), Matryoshka dolls (Russian hollow dolls that stacked inside each other), clay dolls, Peg dolls, Porcelain dolls (of the industrial era), paper dolls, stuffed dolls, black dolls, fashion dolls, action figures, Bobbleheads, and the customizable dolls of the 1990's.



Individuals who love dolls range from young children to senior citizens. For some it is all about pretense and play, for others it is about décor and collections. Some dolls are treasured and passed from one generation to the next, others are merely disposable.



Today, many of us own dolls and value them for sentimental reasons or monetary reasons. These dolls, that are very valuable, usually have historical value, are collectables, or are family heirlooms. Sometimes it is just hard to know the value of our treasures.

The Henry County Historical Society (202 Park St., Bishop Hill, II.) will host a doll appraisal on June 9, 2018 from 10:00am to 4:00pm. The elite appraiser, Ellen Tsagais, will be on site helping you to know your doll's dollar value. She is a renowned author of many books and will appraise the dolls for \$5.00 per doll.
